#### **DRM ATTENDS CONNJAM18**

ConnJam18 was the name the Boy Scouts of America – Connecticut Yankee Council picked to describe their biggest yearly event, a Council-Wide Camporee, which was held at the Orange Fairgrounds in Orange, CT May 11 - 13, 2018. From 3,000 to 5,000 scouts attended the event.

#### MILL PLAIN STATION UPDATE

The 1881 NY&NE RR's Mill Plain station move to the museum is moving ahead. We now await the availability of the building movers Nicholas Brothers to



move the four walls to the platform now constructed on our museum site. Marty Grossman has obtained the necessary permits from the Danbury Building Department, and Jose Alves is arranging permits for the under-the floor wiring.



We had a scare on May 15th, when several tornados hit the Danbury area. In preparation for the move, Dave Gengo of Salem Preservation, had

separated the four walls from the sill, and each other. The structural integrity of the station was significantly compromised! Fortunately, the tornados did not hit the station site, and it survived the blow.

#### MEMBER SAM ABRAM PASSES AWAY

Long-time member Sam Abram passed away suddenly on May 29<sup>th</sup>. For the last several years, Sam spent Tuesday nights working in the library. His love of trains and books went together well and he helped us bring our database up to date. #### **RUNNING A NEW HAVEN RAILROAD ALCO-GE, RS-3 LOCOMOTIVE**

Having been promoted to Locomotive Fireman July 3, 1959, and Engineer in August 1965, I had mucho miles and hours on the throttle with them.

They were dual service locomotives – that is, they were good on  $1^{st}$  Class passenger Service, heavy Maybrook line freight, local freight, and yard switching. At 1600hp, they were equipped with a steam generator for passenger service heat. We used them whether it was  $-10^{\circ}$  or  $90^{\circ}$ ! At  $90^{\circ}$  we needed heat for the diner car as well as hot water for the bathrooms.

As engineer, I loved them! They had the fastest pickup on the throttle of all the engines I ran. Where I ran them on passenger trains was between Danbury and Pittsfield. 50mph was the top speed with them on the Berkshire Line, but I padded those times to 65mph to make up lost time. Can't do that today!

On Cedar Hill, Maybrook freights with a limit of 150 cars fit right in! At certain places on the Maybrook we would regularly get to to about 60mph with no howls from the brass hats in New Haven. Where they really shined on the Maybrook line was in climbing the grades at Shelton, Hopewell, and Towners. At times you would be down to 8 or 9 mph or less, lugging hard sometimes for over an hour, but they would not slip, overheat, or blow up! They just continued to lug!

The cab was a very plain one, no fancy stuff. I felt, and still do, that they were the most comfortable control stand and seat I ever worked. Even running short end fist and me sitting backwards to the controls, it was still very easy and comfortable.

The engine under the hood had every reset, check dipstick gauge, and sight glass within sight or easy reach.

I could go on for pages about the RS-3. We had 45 of them, numbered 517-561; I ran all of them but two.
