# Ten Years Ago

As the Museum closed out the fall 2005 season, it could be said that the Pumpkin Patch trains were highly successful despite some weather that was not always the best. Shortly after the Pumpkin Patch trains ended, preparations began for the Santa Trains.

At long last, thanks to the efforts of then President Ira Pollack, points of interest signage was erected along the eastbound and westbound lanes of I-84. We had smaller signs at the end of Exits 5 and 6, but the larger signs alerted travelers that Danbury had a railway museum. To this day, we have visitors who said they saw the signage and decided to stop.

For a number of years, the Museum collaborated with the New York Transit Museum on excursions to the DRM. In 2005, we enhanced the outing by meeting the group in South Norwalk as they changed trains to travel to Danbury. This allowed the group to hear stories and histories about the branch and the DRM. Yard tours and a train ride were enjoyed by all. Departing Danbury on the 1:44 train, they travelled to South Norwalk where they were greeted by members of the Switch Tower Museum for a tour of that facility.

In the yard, the RPO was being worked on under the direction of Bill Britt who was looking for monetary donations to begin replacing the windows. Also needed were old canvas mail bags that had been phased out by the Post Office.

The Museum has always been a popular place for Western Connecticut State University photography students to visit for class assignments. Usually they came individually but we did have an entire class visit. Our partnership with WestConn continues to this day.

The Grant Writing Committee was busy all year submitting requests to a number of organizations. Three major projects in need of money at the time were the RPO car, New Haven RDC #32 and the Mack Railbus. Only the Mack Railbus never got the funding it needed.

### Milk Car Display Brings Back Memories

Seeing Ben Brown's O-gauge milk car display in one of the two triangular display cases in the Great Room reminds me of my youth. I grew up on a dairy farm in East Hampton, NY, on the Eastern end of Long Island. The Gould Dairy was founded by Jonathan F. Gould, my great grandfather, in 1885. He was the son of Patrick T. Gould, the keeper of the Montauk Point Lighthouse who was appointed to that job by President Andrew Jackson in 1832. The business was passed on to his son, my grandfather J. Arter Gould and Charles O. Gould, Arter's brother. My dad and his cousin took over the business shortly after my dad earned his degree in Business Administration from Syracuse in 1928; later the dairy merged with another in town to become G&T Dairies, Inc., until it went out of business in the 1970's.

My memories were of the merged dairy. Milk was produced, pasteurized, bottled and distributed from the farm. A creamery was established in town and then milk from each dairy farm was processed at the creamery rather at the individual farms. G&T Dairies distributed pasteurized, homogenized, and chocolate milk. There were the usual varieties of heavy cream, light cream, and half-and-half. Eggs came from a chicken farmer located in Bridgehampton. Buttermilk and skim milk were not produced locally but were purchased from an "up Island" dairy, Sheffield Farms, a division of National Dairy Products Corporation (which later became Kraft Foods). Sheffield would ship LCL (less-than-carload) quantities of both milk varieties in glass bottles in a refrigerated milk box car via the Long Island Rail Road for delivery to the team track in East Hampton, barely a quarter mile from the dairy. I remember riding over with my dad in the truck which was backed up to the door of the car so that the cases of bottled product could be unloaded. I did that a number of times until the shipments were converted to truck via Sheffield's private fleet.

That's not the only memory of milk cars I have. When I was Manager of Railway Equipment for Standard Brands Incorporated in New York City in the early 1970's, I managed a variety of tank cars for a variety of bulk



products. The most unusual cars in the tank car fleet were former milk tank cars manufactured and leased by General American Pfaudler Corporation with GPEX reporting marks. A number of dairies such as Hood and Sheffield were lessee customers of General American. The cars were built just after World War II, were 50' long, and looked like a reefer box car but contained two stainless steel tanks. Inlet and outlet valves were accessed through the center door of the car. The Fleischmann Distilling Corporation, a Standard Brands subsidiary, used the milk tank cars to transport 140-proof, four-year-old bourbon whiskey from Owensboro, KY to bottling plants at Peekskill, NY and Plainfield, IL. The cars were ideal due to the stainless steel tanks. When the Federal DOT ruled that alcoholic beverages were hazardous due to flammability, the cars could no longer be used in this service due to enclosed tanks. The cars were then repurposed by Standard Brands and placed into bulk vinegar service, also due to the stainless steel tanks. When the cars were retired, most were scrapped but one of the "bourbon" or "vinegar" milk tank cars, GPEX 1021, was saved by the Illinois Railway Museum in Union, IL.

So come on down to the Museum and see which display will stir up a memory or two for you!
