#### 2012 - 2013 Restoration Update

It was slow going during the years 2012 and 2013 due to untimely health issues for this project leader.

Beginning with 2012, we completed the exterior of the cupola by installing fascia boards, installed all the windows and painted the entire exterior (photo 1).

We then took down all the scaffolding which had been up since 2008. The caboose once again is free standing (photo 2). It was time to start on the interior by installing fascia boards (photo 3), replacing bathroom walls (photo 4) and starting on the cupola seats (photo 5).

In 2013, we completed the cupola seats on the south side (photo 6). We started to take apart all of the cabinets. At this time it was decided to replace all of the cabinet doors. Yellow pine tongue and groove flooring boards were picked for this project. The boards needed to be chamfered and will be done this year.

Volunteers for the years 2012 - 2013 were Harry Burke, Franz Gerencir, Gerry Herrmann, Stan Madyda, Dave Roberts and Danielle Spino. Total volunteer hours for 2012 and 2013 were 911.



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# Founding of the Danbury Railway Museum - Part 2

With the Railroad Museum of New England backing out of their plans to move to Danbury, a grassroots effort to establish a museum gathered momentum. As early as 1993, some of our founders discussed this possibility. In March 1994, the Danbury Railway Museum was incorporated in the State of Connecticut. In fact, many projects and assignments were identified as early as February 1994.

L. Peter Cornwall was named President. Peter had been very involved with the RMNE in getting them to move to Danbury. Peter McLachlan became our first Vice President and Terri Stramiello and Jesse Meeker were named Secretary and Treasurer, respectively. Local businessman, Hal Meeker, was appointed by Mayor Gene Eriquez as the first Board Chairman. Hal and others in the Danbury community believed a railway museum would thrive in Danbury and worked from the early days to make this happen. Other first-term Board members named by the mayor were Charlie Bardo, Dennis Elpern, John Flower, Margaret Gagnon, Joseph Heyman, John Holbrooke, Tom Leonard, Albert Matthews, Mike Neustadt, Felice Plain and Dwyer Wedvick.

Members of the WestConn Chapter of the National Railway Historical Society gave their support to the museum. Ed Blackman began exploring excursions that the Museum could undertake and Dan Foley started to look for any piece of railway equipment that could be donated. The City of Danbury was doing their part in securing a \$2.5 million grant to restore Danbury Union Station in addition to working with CDOT to get access to the railyard. Unfortunately, the freight house had already been torn down. This would have given the Museum far more space for storage, offices and exhibits.

held at City Hall introducing the idea of the Museum and by April, memberships started to come in. By July, there were close to 100 members.

A business plan was written outlining what the museum hoped to be in the near and long term. At the start, it was hoped that excursion service could be run to the Mall and back on a regular basis. This would have given the Museum a lot of exposure in the community as well as necessary funds. Going beyond Danbury, the plan included running less than regular excursions with our own equipment and crews to Beacon, Derby and Pittsfield. Estimates were as high as 140,000 passengers in the first year of operation with revenues of \$1,000,000. There was also an idea of having a dinner train operating along the Maybrook Line to possibly Hopewell Junction.

While all of this was going on, Sperry Rail had been sold. There was some discussion of looking at the Sperry building as a restoration shop should the new owners decide to close the Danbury operations. This of course never happened and Sperry did make our first corporate monetary donation.

So much was going on in the first few months as plans were being discussed and progress was being made on the Station. The Museum still needed the yard secured, a place to meet and equipment in place.

The next installment will look at events from mid-year through to the end of the year.

### Words from Our President

On October 26<sup>th</sup>, we completed the successful 2014 Pumpkin Patch event - up almost 7% from last year. As you are aware, Pumpkin Patch is one of our major events, but what else is happening at the DRM about which you may not have heard?

In late September, the DRM was host to *Shape* magazine and a host of guests that photographed various fall fashions on selected pieces of our yard, building and rail equipment. A quick view of their November 2014 issue will allow you to visit our trains as visited and exposed within their magazine. In early October we were again exposed to the fashion industry, this time on *Shopbop*, an Internet shopping connection that again featured the DRM as a fall clothing arena. Unfortunately, the shoot results were only viewable for one week shortly after the actual shoot. Thumb nails may show up in the future.

Within the building, we have been busy updating the various displays. The N-gauge layout now has new train displays on top and a new plywood skirt surround in place of the old curtains which allows for secure storage under the layout. A similar plywood skirt surround was added to the base of the G-gauge resulting in more storage. An eight-foot-long double-sided trapezoid-shaped display case was placed upon a raised base and has been placed in the main hall to display a newly donated model and associated items for a milk car display. A duplicate display case has also been moved into the main hall and features many newly acquired railway artifacts, which were previously not displayed. Personal artwork and drawings by Vic Westman is now displayed in the main hall.

Moving outside into the yard, extensive work on our well-visited garden model railroad has transpired. Bill Arm, Don Konen, Wade Roese, Jim Teer and some WestConn volunteers have taken apart the old ties and installed a new, lengthened three-tier tie base surround. This will receive a redesigned and enhanced multi-loop operational train venue. A future interactive display will allow DRM members and visitors alike, to share trackage rights with "live steamers" and electric specialists. A little further back in the yard, Justin Chapin, Wade Roese, Jim Teer, and Jeff VanWagenen scurried down to Westport, CT a couple of weeks ago (with trailers in tow) and returned with 16 target signals and associated stands. The equipment was formally utilized on the overhead catenary system on the Glenbrook line and has been donated to the DRM.

Speaking of donations, back in 2009 the DRM was informed that a piece of memorabilia was available and we were asked if we were interested. We expressed that we were. Tick-tock...time passed, up and down with the donation and where it was to go, when it was to go and who/whom owned it. Last we heard it was not coming to Danbury. Then, on October 22, 2014, we received a phone call. It was coming to Danbury! On October 24, 2014, a 40-foot tractor-trailer delivered the formerly New Haven Station displayed, operational "Solari" board. This will be displayed within the Danbury Railway Museum building...soon.
