RPO News & Notes


The exterior of the car is now complete with the exception of the lettering, the diaphragms and a few very small details. The lettering will probably have to wait until the spring when the weather clears, unless we can get someone that can work on it fulltime for a day or so.

We have had a bit of a problem coming up with a suitable material to make the diaphragms. Heavy canvas is not readily available; we have found a vinyl material that has UV inhibitors so it should last, but it does not have the "hand" or "drape" of the original. We are still looking.

Work has begun on the lighting inside the car. Substitute fixtures have been made and installed; the wiring however may take time to sort out, since the original wiring was just cut out without regard to any replacement. The remainder of the interior work carpentry, sheet metal, pipe work, painting, etc. depend on budget constrictions and our ability to work as temperatures fall.


DID YOU KNOW that the Post Office contracts with the railroads permitted Postal Superintendents at transfer stations of mail to delay any train up to 28 minutes to complete mail transfers? This included passenger trains such as the Twentieth Century Limited, etc., however this was not done very often.

Pilot Truck with Broken Wheel

The Danbury Railway Museum received a steam locomotive's lead truck from Metro-North several years ago when it was removed from the mud near the Hudson River. One of the wheels is broken. It has been cleaned up and painted as a display piece in the DRM's railyard. However, we did not have details about the history of this historic piece.



Just recently an article appeared on the Internet. A couple of DRM members excitedly forwarded this item this editor, thinking it would be of interest to the membership. The article's author, Tommy Meehan, has graciously given permission for it to be printed in this newsletter. If anyone reading this has further information, photos of the locomotive mentioned in the article, or comment, please email the *newsletter@danburyrail.org*. Following is the article:

Someone had mentioned to me that MNCW workers found an old engine truck buried in the mud of Annsville Creek when they were installing the new bridge (non-movable) and causeway there, northwest of Peekskill. It was the lead truck off a New York Central & Hudson River Buchanan-designed locomotive. (William Buchanan being Central's chief engineer back in the 19th century when the road designed and even built a lot of its own power.) I mentioned having seen a news article about an accident there. This weekend I found the news clippings.

According to both the NY Herald and Peekskill's Highland Democrat, the accident took place just before 2 PM on Friday 4-7-1882. It involved a northbound way freight, working from the West Side to Poughkeepsie. Both papers reported the engine was NYC&HR 74, which was a 4-4-0 built by Danforth Cooke in 1864 and bore the name L.W. Jerome. Apparently 74 survived the wreck since a roster shows it being renumbered 130 in 1890.

The train had left W. 30th St at 5 AM and reached Peekskill about 1:25. After working the station area it departed north with 23 cars about 1:50

PM. Meantime, the Annsville draw - which was a swing span at that time - had opened to pass a lumber schooner. (There was a lot of commercial activity up along Annsville Creek back then. A wire foundry consisted of over 20 buildings!) The draw was just beginning to close when the freight came along. Witnesses all agreed that the engineer did not brake until he was a few car lengths from the draw. However, the engineer and fireman (who both jumped clear of the wreck, along with the head brakeman) swore the signals showed clear. As the engine went off the rails and into the opening, witnesses said it actually hit the draw span. They said it made a very loud clanging or metal-on-metal noise. The engine, tender and three or four cars all went in the water. In order to get the main line open (apparently the swing span was not damaged) the wrecking crew only removed the equipment they could reach above the water line. Service was restored by 5 PM. In the meantime, local boaters carried passengers from at least one train around the wreck in small boats.


The rest of the equipment was fished out over the next couple of weeks. Though I can't say for sure NYC&HR 74 was the locomotive whose engine truck was found over 100 years later, I'd say the odds are pretty good. tommy meehan

Parties are held on Saturdays from 11am-1pm, and 2-4pm. Sunday parties are from 2-4pm.




January - March parties include:

A \$50 non-refundable reservation fee is required at time of reservation. Museum members receive \$10 off regular party prices.




One family delighted us with a photographic remembrance of their son Noah's birthday party at the Museum.


